Conservation of Biodiversity of College Campus: 2016-17

(...Activities in continuation of 2015-16)

Our campus is spread over 55 acres and holds an array of flora and fauna. It consists of some rare trees and animals. There was a need of preparation of a record of the biodiversity of the campus. IQAC of our college took an initiative towards the conservation of diversity and preparation of a checklist. In order to bring this program into regular practice, every year (from 2015) in the month of August, newly admitted students were gathered and addressed regarding the importance of diversity of the campus. Under this program, the students were given awareness about the commonly found flora and fauna of the campus by the staff. The details of some events related to this program are as follows;

1. Rescue and Protection of Local Wildlife of the campus.

The students rescued and released a juvenile Asian Palm Civet within its home range which had accidentally entered zoological museum. Karthik Kenganavar of B. Sc III semester (C.Z.IF) volunteered and rescued it. The students were brought awareness regarding the importance of the animal, its behaviour, its distribution and its IUCN status.

2. Checklist of Flora of the College Campus:

Under the 'Conservation of Biodiversity of College Campus Program: IQAC along with the support of Department of Botany decided to involve students in preparation of Checklist of Flora of the College Campus. The students of B. Sc 1st & 3rd Semester (Zoology) were allotted to work under this program. In the month of August, student groups consisting of 5-6 members were asked to select the group of their interest and task was allotted. Their progress in this regard was closely monitored by the staff. Students with Botany combination were involved and actively participated in compilation of the report.

3. Cataloguing and Maintenance of Specimens of Botany and Zoology Museum along with collaboration of Department of Botany and Zoology.
